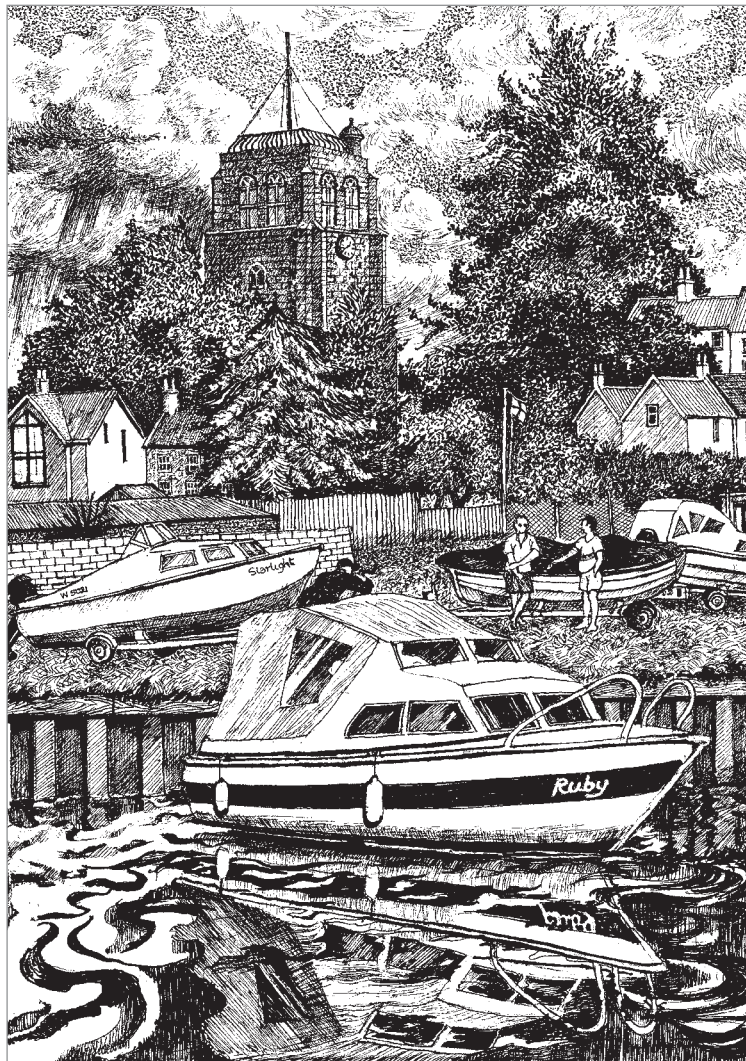
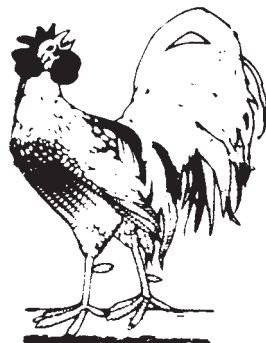

Need Pension Advice?

Following pension reforms on 6th April, people approaching retirement have greater freedom over how they can use their pension pots. They may take a lump sum, take out an annuity, or a mixture of both. 'Pension Wise' is a new Government service designed to help people understand their pension options and to enable them to make informed choices.

Diss, Thetford & District Citizens Advice will be delivering freeface-to-face 'Pension Wise' sessions by appointment (appointments can be made now) giving people access to free, impartial and local pension guidance. The 45 minute sessions will be tailored to the individual, taking into account their circumstances and their plans for retirement.

A Pension Wise appointment may help you if:

- You are approaching retirement or are 55 or over
- Have a defined contribution pension
- Are thinking of accessing your pension in the next six months

Guidance appointments are also available by telephone, delivered by the Pensions Advisory Service. Information and general guidance can be accessed online at www.pensionwise.gov.uk.

Tom Smith, Specialist Guidance Caseworker of Diss, Thetford & District Citizens Advice, said: *Pension Wise appointments will help people to make sense of their pension choices. Diss, Thetford & District Citizens Advice already helps people with retirement issues and we'll continue to offer that service too.*

Pension Wise sessions take place at Shelfanger Road, Diss, IP22 4FH, Mondays to Fridays between 10am and 3pm and at other Citizens Advice locations throughout Norfolk and Suffolk.

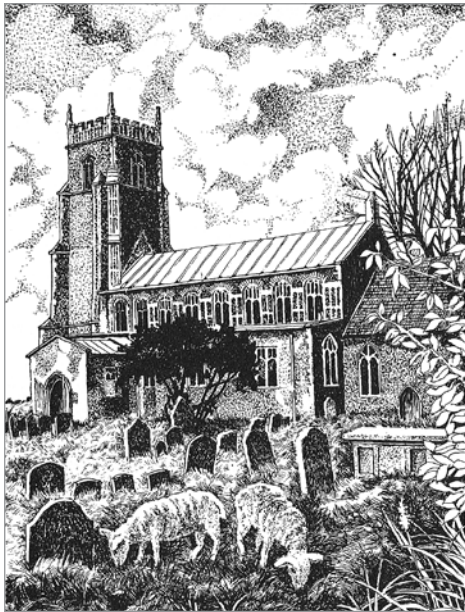

St John the Baptist Church News

We have had a busy couple of months. A wedding ceremony between Jessica Wheeler and Michael Morris took place on Saturday, 30th May. The bride arrived in a horse-drawn carriage; the bridegroom, his best man and ushers came in three enormous Case tractors. The Vicar, Rev'd Wendy Evans, was so impressed she took photographs! The bride's and bridegroom's families decorated the church beautifully. We wish Jessica and Michael many happy years together.

Funerals at Bressingham Church are infrequent but sadly we have recently said goodbye to two people, large congregations attended both of services. On 18th June, Paul Brooke, a well-known farmer formerly of Valley Farm, was buried. Paul had served this village for decades as churchwarden and chairman of the Parish Council. Six days later, on the 24th June, we had the service for Sheila Curson, wife of our tower captain, Edward. Sheila had also been a bell ringer and died following a very short illness. At the time of writing, we have heard of the death of Margaret Holding. Margaret was the daughter of Frank and Vera Lanchester and had requested that she return to Bressingham following her death, to be buried near her parents. To all bereaved families of these we send our deepest sympathy.

We enjoyed a couple of events at the church recently. The Friends of St John the Baptist hosted a 'Wildflower Talk and Walk' by Stella Taylor in the church and church yard on Saturday, 23rd May, which was attended by over 50 adults and children. Stella's willingness to share her knowledge and love of wildflowers was appreciated by everyone. Overall, £325 was raised. On Saturday, 27th June, enticed by lovely, sunny and warm weather, attendees at a Strawberry Tea in the church and church grounds enjoyed music, strawberries, scones and good company. Many thanks go to participants and helpers at both events. Further thanks are due to Strawberry Tea raffle prize donors; Bressingham Steam Museum and Garden, and Wyevale Bressingham and restaurant. The afternoon raised £500.



St John the Baptist is now, unfortunately, on Historic England's 'At Risk Register'. Our architect has recommended an extensive programme of vital structural repairs that must be done this year to make the building weather proof and prevent further decay. All leaking gutters and downpipes must be entirely replaced, the drainage improved, the south aisle lead roof re-laid and some localized flint work repairs made. There are additional urgent structural repairs needed, adding up to several hundred thousand pounds worth of work, that the small congregation and Friends alone cannot fund. We are currently applying for Heritage Lottery Fund assistance and should we be successful, proceeds from the Wildflower Day, Strawberry Tea and 'Friends' membership fees will count towards the Partnership Funding requirement. Our application will be submitted no later than 17th August, 2015 and the outcome known in November, 2015. Fingers crossed!

Once the project is approved (optimistically written!), we will initiate a series of heritage based community activities. Watch this space!

As many will recall, Roger and Millie Aves were committed to raising funds for reroofing the South porch following a lead theft. On Sunday, 5th July, at a service led by our Rector, Canon Tony Billett,

the Bishop of Thetford, the Rt Revd Alan Winton, dedicated the restored South Porch roof in memory of Roger and Millie whom everyone remembers fondly for their many contributions to the village and to the church. Roger and Millie's families attended, joined by villagers, Diss Team members and local politicians – our MP, Richard Bacon, Norfolk County Councillor, Beverley Spratt, and South Norfolk Councillor, Barry Stone with his wife, Margaret. The barrel organ was played to accompany the hymns, Rodney Briscoe valiantly cranking as fast as he could as the congregation tried to follow the organ's slow pace. As the Bishop wryly remarked, barrel organs are notoriously temperamental. Following the service, wine, homemade lemonade and elderflower cordial with nibbles were served.

June 1st 2015, six Parish Councillors met at Fersfield Church with one apology received.

Co-option Richard Hewitt was unanimously co-opted to the Parish Council. He will continue to monitor Highways issues in the Parish villages.

Recorder The Parish Council expressed appreciation for the long and conscientious service that Jean

Harvey has provided as Recorder of Parish Council meetings for many years. Jean retired from the role from May 2015 and is replaced by Leonora Pearce.

Notice Boards The new village notice boards have now arrived and will shortly be seen opposite the Village Shop, at Fersfield Church Meadow and in Common Road adjacent to the telephone box. There may be a short delay in setting up the Common Road board while permissions are obtained.

Planning Item 2015/1081 Crown Farm Barn, Wood Lane, insulation improvements were approved.

Item 2015/0564 72 Common Road Bressingham is going to South Norfolk Planning Committee on Wednesday 3rd June (recommendation to refuse).

'Meet your Parish Councillors' The Parish Council plans to provide opportunities for Councillors and villagers to meet together. These meetings will start in the Autumn and will be advertised by leaflets, posters and on the village website

FERSFIELD NEWS

St Andrew's Church

In early June, our new Consultant Architect, Brian Haward, visited St Andrew's with Matthew Mc.Dade (Diocesan Advisory Committee Secretary) and our contractor, John Hogg. Apart from being a really valuable introductory meeting, we were able to make the decision that the chancel was ready to be put back into use, despite much more external and internal work being required. We were delighted that the chancel was re-commissioned by John's firm on 23rd June, the south wall having dried adequately. The heavy monument will not be replaced until all the re-plastering and decoration have been



completed at some future date. For now, though, we have the full church and organ back in use, although, having enjoyed the location so much, we will continue to use the South Chapel for our smaller services and events.

There is, of course, a long way to go in terms of restoring the chancel's ability to resist the weather and restoring the interior. We are going to need considerable funding, and in addition to the heroic fundraising being undertaken, we will need to apply for grant aid from various agencies. This means extensive use of modern technology to monitor and communicate our financial status. We are very grateful to Paul Sumpter for taking on the role of our Finance Officer: his accountancy skills will be invaluable.

By the time you receive this edition of 'Cock Crow' there will still be two Friday film sessions to go: 'Out of Africa' on 7th August and 'The Selfish Giant' on 14th August. Organised by Creative Arts East and Sophie Gosman, it will be a splendid way of spending an evening.

On Saturday 1st August the church will be holding a 'Cake, Coffee and Chat' morning from 10am

to 12 noon. There will be books, a raffle and stalls, too. We hope to see you there. Proceeds, inevitably, will go towards the chancel restoration.

Looking forward to the Autumn Season, we are planning a late afternoon Harvest Thanksgiving Service followed by an 'Early Supper', also in the church, on Sunday 18th October. Details will be available later.

Already thinking of next year, we are really excited about combining with St John's at Bressingham to hold an 'Open Gardens' for the weekend of 25th/26th June 2016. It will be wonderful for the two parishes to work together in order to raise money to ensure that future generations may benefit from the use of the two beautiful and historic churches. 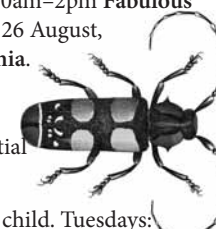

NORTH LOPHAM

North Lopham Parish Council

8th July 2015. Apologies: None

Present: All councillors (still 2 under strength), Mr Farren-Bradley, Ms S Molloy, 4 members of the public. The Parish clerk was absent because of ill health, wishes for her speedy recovery were expressed.

Proposed development in Kings Head Lane: Ms Molloy, architect to the scheme, gave a presentation about the outline planning application for up to 6 dwellings on a site at the end of Kings Head Lane. The intention, should the scheme proceed to full planning approval, is to apply for 3 dwellings only. Discussion followed but no decision made at this stage.

Traffic calming: Crown has instructed its drivers not to exceed 25mph through the village. Their subcontractors will receive a similar request.

Community Speedwatch: will be up and running by the end of July.

NCC Partnership Scheme: To consult NCC Highways dept. about feasibility and cost of making a footpath with kerb from 'The Bull' to Cherry Tree Close. 50/50 funding could be available from NCC, application needed by December. Public financial support may be sought.

Neighbourhood Plan: As a 'toe in the water', Mr Farren-Bradley proposed that an application be made to Breckland, in consultation with them, to designate the area enclosed by the N Lopham parish boundary for the purpose of NLPC producing a Neighbourhood Plan. If accepted, there is no commitment to go further. This was agreed.

Telephone box: It was agreed to proceed with the restoration of this 'listed' building, the final cost could be £800-£1,000. End use is still to be finalised.

Vacancies: 2 councillors are still needed.

Village Sign: Refurbishment done by Mike Daley, thanks expressed to him.

Village Hall: Gates have been moved, thanks expressed to the committee. Dog and litter bins, with accompanying signage, are being applied for. It is hoped that the field will be used more as a result.

Methodist Chapel: Plans have been submitted for change of use, development as a dwelling and removal of headstones. No decision at this stage.

A request to upgrade Jubilee Lane to 'restricted by-way' status has been received by NCC. Process is lengthy.

South Lopham Parish Council

Meeting held on 2nd July 2015 at Valley Farm, Low Common.

Present: Councillors John Crisp, Sarah Martin, Tim Frizzell and David Huggins and Mrs Chapman Allen (District Councillor). Mrs Martin deputised as clerk as Mrs Phillips was unable to attend.

Village meeting Recent correspondence from the Chairman of the Lophams Society was discussed and it was decided that a response should be sent to the Chairman acknowledging his letter. As the Council holds regular meetings advertised in advance to which all parishioners are welcome the Council is happy for the Society to take the initiative regarding the Village Meeting.

Telephone kiosk: Jim Pursehouse was not in attendance but will report at the next meeting. John Crisp had had discussions with a parishioner living near the box who felt that the book exchange was supported and was also used by people living outside the village.

Finance: In the absence of the Clerk, the Chairman reported the Bank balances and approval was given for payment of various accounts. £184.24 was received from Breckland in respect of the bottle bank.

Planning: Mrs Martin reported on the current position. White Horse: marquee and hedging undecided, Bridge Farm: replacement dwelling undecided, Noddle Farm: lifting of conditions, partial approval, Lansdowne House alterations and extension undecided, Nissen hut behind Allotment Farm permitted

development. Although Councillors felt this was not suitable conversion to a dwelling their opinion had not been sought.

Use of land in Brick Kiln Lane: It was reported that this land appeared to be being used as a builder's yard and another large portable building had been placed there. The Enforcement Officer is to be informed.

Highways: Mrs Chapman Allen had contacted County highways on behalf of the Parish. Further signs awaited by NCC. Repairs to Blo Norton road were inadequate, either only partially complete or paint markings had been ignored. Mrs Chapman Allen suggested that our County Councillor should be contacted to arrange a meeting with NCC. Highways concerning moving the 30mph signs on the A1066. A fire hydrant marker in Church Road is broken and Anglian Water to be contacted by John Crisp.

Community: David Huggins reported that village hall gates had been moved back to allow easier access when the gates are locked. David Huggins reported on works of improvement by Gressingham Foods and will be at their August meeting.

Footpaths: Tim Frizzell reported on footpaths that needed clearing between Duttlebridge and Rectory Corner and between Duttlebridge and Chequers Farm. The Parish Clerk to write to land owner. Bus shelter had been tidied and old notices removed. Rubbish behind shelter to be investigated and source traced. Tim will inspect and clean the Jubilee Bench. There was a request that out of date signs advertising functions in either of the villages be removed as soon as possible after the event. John Crisp will investigate refurbishment of the Village sign.

AOB: The Clerk had sent the Parish Audit to Mazars and thanks were expressed to Mr Hodgson for his internal audit work.

A moorhen, whose nest we had discovered in the most perilous place managed to hatch her eggs and we saw her with three adorable fluffy black chicks. We hope they survived.

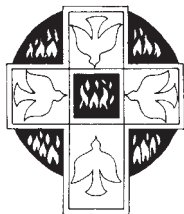

Jesus 'Blessed are those who mourn'. It is only those who love who are capable of true mourning. To open one's heart is to begin to live.

The world – 'Blessed are the tough and strong'.

Jesus 'Blessed are the Gentle'. Gentleness does not mean weakness; it is a form of strength.

The world – 'Blessed are those who hunger for power, status & fame'.

Jesus 'Blessed are those who hunger for what is right'.

The world – 'Blessed are those who show no mercy, who take no prisoners'.

Jesus 'Blessed are the merciful' Happy are those who make allowances' for the sins of others, whose greatness is in their power to forgive.

The world – 'Blessed are the trouble makers and war-mongers'.

Jesus 'Blessed are the peacemakers', who spread understanding, who welcome the stranger, who work for a just society.

The world – 'Blessed are those who cheat and get away with it'.

Jesus 'Blessed are those who suffer' who make a stand for what is right.

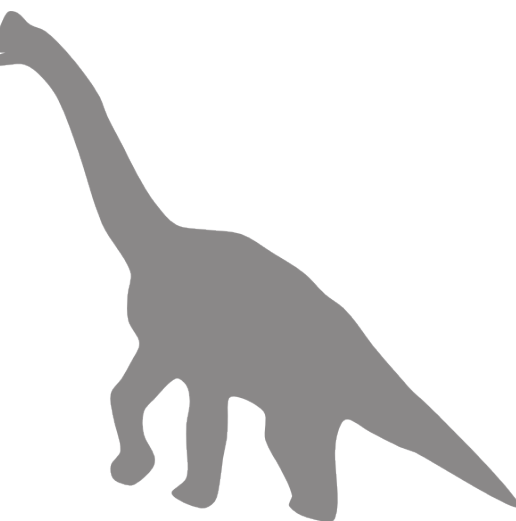

KS2 children put on a play for their parents 'Midas and the Golden Touch'. The children all worked incredibly hard to learn their lines and made all of the staff and parents very proud.

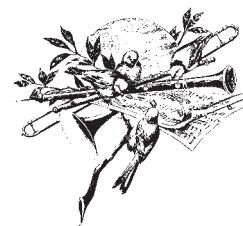

It's been a busy couple of months for the Gissing PCC and the Friends of Gissing Church. Over the weekend of the 12th to 14th June the Friends organized a Flower Festival with music. The theme of the event was summer weddings and, in addition to some truly stunning flower displays, the church was also filled with wedding memorabilia, including photographs and some wonderful dresses from local brides. We send heartfelt thanks to all those who lent us their precious photos and dresses, to our talented flower arrangers and to everyone who helped with refreshments and the 1001 other jobs that are associated with an event like this.



On Saturday evening the Gissing Singers gave a concert entitled 'A Summer Songbook'. We were delighted to welcome Richard Bacon MP to introduce the event and we offer our sincere thanks to the Singers for another wonderful and varied programme of music. We sold over 80 tickets for the concert and most people stayed afterwards for cheese, wine and a good chat!

The Festival raised almost £1200 towards much needed repairs and improvements to the Church.

As well as introducing the concert, Mr Bacon was able to announce that we have been successful in the first stage of our Heritage Lottery Fund bid. We applied to HLF earlier in the year for funding to undertake urgent structural repairs and to provide other facilities including an improved electrical supply and a modern heating system. HLF have awarded us a development grant of just over £30,000 to help us prepare detailed plans and to undertake further

work in support of our stage 2 submission which has to be made within a year of this first award. In addition to this excellent news we were also able to announce that Norfolk Churches Trust have awarded us £5000 towards the project. This is a wonderful boost to all of us who have laboured long and hard with bids and fundraising.

Our next fund raising event will be the village party on the 1st of August. If you live in the village look out for your ticket to this 'invitation only' event. Following that we will be at the Summer Fete towards the end of August. Pirates young and old can enjoy the display of can-can dancing and some may be pleased to exchange the rolling quarter deck for a quieter ride in a tractor.

Old favourites such as Splat the Rat, Fishing for Ducks and the Bric-a-Brac stall will, of course, be there too. Live music will be provided by the Tinks and Ball Blues Band outside the Gissing Crown pub where Kevin will be offering a selection of real ales and possibly the odd tot of rum.

Visitors will also find it easier to park this year as the base for the new village car park has now been laid next to the bowling green and church. Car access is from Rectory Road.

Lottery bid progress

Hopes are high and a lot of fingers are crossed in Gissing this summer as we wait to see whether our bid for substantial funding from the Big Lottery has been successful. Stage 3 of the bid was submitted in June and the outcome should be known by the first half of October this year.

If we get the go-ahead, we can then begin to implement the carefully laid plans for enhancing the facilities at The Old School. Building work could start in May 2016 with completion scheduled for early 2017. There will be a specially designed performance and rehearsal space and a large function room available for community, private and business occasions.

There will also be a simple, part-time café area which will provide an attractive space for people to meet in, whether dropping their little ones off at The Children's Centre in the adjoining part of the building, enjoying some arts and crafts at the monthly Crafter's Café or just stopping off for a chat and a refreshing cup of tea.

A stimulating programme of activities is being

developed to make full use of the new facilities. The Community Arts Group which includes The Community Dance & Theatre Group will run projects and courses for young people in dance, drama and musical theatre and Show Stars will provide arts-related activities for young adults with learning difficulties.



Older people have not been forgotten. An exercise class for the over 65s is on the cards and a series of talks and events which will explore the distinctive historical and ecological features of South Norfolk will be launched under the umbrella of the Claylands Programme. Existing community clubs such as the Gissing Singers and the Gardening and Reading Groups will be able to spread themselves in the more comfortable surroundings of the new building.

Plans of the new building are on display on the notice board near the Gissing Crown; a launch party is planned to really get the show on the road.

Gissing Youth Group

An important date for your diary if you have youngsters aged 8 to 13 years. We have planned an exciting programme of adventure evenings scheduled to begin in September this year. It is the first of a new initiative to set up various activities/events for young people in the area. Headed up by Heart of Gissing, the sessions will be led by Adam Osborne of Osborne Adventures and the evenings will be held mostly out of doors, near The Old School in Gissing.

Each of the Adam Osborne sessions can only take 10 youngsters, so don't miss out if you would like to take part; early booking is advisable.

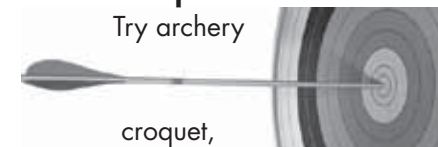
