## South Norfolk community transport service calls for more drivers

### Can you spare some time to help with a vital community service?

Borderhoppa provides community transport for residents of more than forty parishes in South Norfolk. Volunteer drivers are urgently needed to help with regular outings. "Community transport works because of the time given by volunteer drivers, office staff and trustees" explains Lucy Edwards, Borderhoppa Manager. "We really need drivers to help with our special outings, such as trips to the coast, lunches and visits to garden centres."

Users are able to get out and about and meet up with friends, which they may otherwise be unable to do as they have access to neither a car nor a regular commerical bus service.

"Social isolation and loneliness are real problems in rural areas," said Lucy, "and community transport is often that vital link, thus contributing to good health and mental well-being."

Drivers must have a D1 category on their licence, i.e entitlement to drive a minibus with no more than 18 passengers. Mileage expenses are paid but the time commitment is a gift to the community.

### Remembrance

Remembrance can take many different forms; from suddenly remembering an incident that happened many decades ago in childhood, pleasant or otherwise, to a more formal act of remembrance, such as Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day. You can be affected suddenly and for an inexplicable reason by a sudden smell, taste, or picture which triggers off the memories of a previous experience that come flooding back.

We are coming up to the season of Remembering, and it is perfectly normal to remember both the good times and the bad times. For me the question is how to use those memories. For there will be mixed up emotions of deep pain and wonderful joy.

Remembrance Sunday/Armistice Day focuses our attention on all those who have laid down their lives, or been seriously harmed in body, mind or Spirit in conflict. On All Souls Day we remember all those who have died. All Saints Day we remember All the Saints of God - those who have gone before us rejoicing in His Kingdom and those who are still with us today. Yes, we remember Christmas Day and all the joy and festivities that are associated with that day; but remember that the 28th of December is Holy Innocents Day, when we remember those children murdered under the authority of Herod and all children subsequently murdered since then. On such a day I also remember those who have died due to Cot Death, Road Traffic Incidents, etc.

Remembrance can be both joyful and deeply painful. Fr Francis McNutt has written on the subject of healing of the memories. I personally cope by taking those powerful memories of pain and loss and leave them at the foot of the cross, whilst actively opening up to God, seeking the presence of the Holy Spirit to aid me in the here and now.

### **Burston and Shimpling Parish Council**

The summer months seem quiet as there was no meeting of Council in August, but the work of the councillors continues. Farmers and landowners have been approached in connection with rights of way that need attention, and we have liaised with Norfolk Highways about matters of concern. A new edition of the Parish Planet has been produced, this time using in-house expertise, and also we co-operated with the organisers of the Burston Strike School Rally to try and ensure that the impact on the village was minimised. This year there were more official stewards than ever, and the problems of parking on the roads in the village were minimised. Refurbishing the various benches in the villages, and the village signs has also begun, and a new mower has been obtained for the village caretaker. So, behind the scenes, a lot has been going on, as usual.

### **Community Action Team**

The usual village barbecue, held on the Saturday before the Strike Rally, was a bit different this year, mainly because the weather was wet, so the event was held in the church, with the cooking done in a gazebo in the churchyard. ### **Burston School**

After a restful holiday, we welcome back all our pupils and extend a warm welcome to those who have joined us in Reception and from other schools. We hope you enjoy your time with us.

We have a packed half term in KS2 this term. Our topic for the first half term is Rainforests. After identifying the different rainforests in the world, they will be comparing their climate and location. We'll look at the rare species of animals that are found, which layer of the forest they live in and why. Children will use their maths skills to compare data on climate between London and one of the rainforests, find out about the indigenous tribes and how deforestation is affecting them. Science will link to this when the children are learning about habitats and adaptation.

The second half of the term will focus on Ancient Egypt. The children will look at the importance of the Nile and how the Ancient Egyptians used this in a variety of ways in their society. We will also be looking at the Pharaohs, Gods and Goddesses, the Pyramids and their inventions. The children will also have a chance to write on Papyrus, make their own cartouches and Shadufs. We are also going to be celebrating Harvest and Macmillan Coffee.

During the afternoons, Class 1 is going to be looking at the topic of 'people who help us' and carrying out activities based on this. We will be thinking about people who help us at home, in school and in the community. In RE we are going to be talking about special clothes, with a focus on clothes that are worn during festivals and celebrations. Our PSHE lessons will be about new beginnings and how we can make our classroom a safe, happy and fair environment for everyone. During music, we'll be exploring duration whilst singing and playing musical instruments.

### **Remembering Jim Philip**

Events in the village have been overshadowed by the loss of Dr Jim Philip who sadly passed away in early August. Jim, a Gissing resident for nearly fifty years had long proved to be one of its most loyal friends and learned inhabitants, pioneering much of its social and cultural activities. It is ironic that we lost him the week the first turf was cut for the new community building, a project most dear to his heart.

Jim served on the Parish Council for the majority of his Gissing years, many as its chairman. He was very active politically and often 'took up the cudgel' on behalf of the village. He was a Devonian by birth but after graduating from King's College Cambridge and a spell in the USA he decided to make East Anglia his spiritual home. For many years he lectured in English and American studies at Essex University and finished a fine academic career as a councillor with the Open University.

Jim was a fun-loving guy who really enjoyed participating in village events, from the Christmas

panto, his annual Easter Egg Hunt and games of cricket with the Gissing Pedestrians. He never lost his faith in the quest for a cohesive, caring community. The aspirations of the Heart of Gissing, whose constitution he conceived, bear testament to this.

He leaves a huge vacuum in the fabric of our village and its affairs. We shall all miss his energy, his dependable friendship, his humour and that unforgettable smile.

*Defibrillator:* recently used in earnest. The system worked but sadly, in spite of all efforts, it was unsuccessful.

*The Trod:* Preparatory work will begin shortly, work proper to start in February.

Settlement Boundary: Cllr Chapman Allen explained that a public consultation period will run 19th Sept to 31st Oct. when proposals can be viewed and comments made via the Breckland website. Current recommendation is to 'tidy' some anomalies but leave the SB largely unchanged. There are no plans for large scale development, only 20 new houses would be permitted within the boundary until 2036 and none outside. Parish Council would have much greater power to influence decisions.


*Views on Policing:* No representations received from public so PC Chairman replied to survey outlining the numerous traffic calming measures already undertaken and asking for greater police backup.
